BRANDON BOYLAN

2026 District Teacher of the Year

BRANDON BOYLAN, MULE TIME MEDIA TEACHER AT ALAMO HEIGHTS JUNIOR SCHOOL, IS THE 2026 ALAMO HEIGHTS ISD TEACHER OF THE YEAR.

Boylan joined Alamo Heights ISD in 2024. He began his teaching career in 2014 and has also served as an elementary and middle school English Language Arts teacher.

His classroom is a fully-functioning newsroom led by seventh and eighth graders who cover timely, newsworthy topics around their campus and the district, with the assistance of Boylan's service dog Buzz who brings smiles to the student journalists' faces daily.

"At the end of the day, the classroom community is not really about the teacher," says Boylan. "Certainly, I set the standard, yet it is the students who build the home. Thus, I deem it vital to put students in positions where they can be successful as leaders in and contributors to the classroom community. This is where the student-centric classroom comes into play. As I see it, it is my job to facilitate the learning rather than conveying it. My job is to hand the students the paint rather than painting the path for them."

Boylan will represent AHISD as the district's nominee for the Trinity Prize for Excellence in Teaching and Region 20 Teacher of the Year.

"Brandon stands apart not only for what he does in the classroom, but for how deeply his work shapes culture, opportunity, and student voice across our campus and beyond," says Dr. Stuart Guthrie, AHJS Principal. "Teacher of the Year should represent excellence in instruction, leadership, and impact. Brandon Boylan exemplifies all three. Our students are better because of him. Our campus is stronger because of him."

Through the expansion of the Mary Norman Journalism Fund, Marie Kisner '69 is not only supporting the journalism program at Alamo Heights High School, but she is also funding excellence for our media scholars at Alamo Heights Junior School. MULES UP to our alumni who are committed to helping our students succeed!



In November, each campus hosted a Teacher of the Year nomination process and selected one teacher who exemplifies the Profile of a Learner to represent their campus this year. A Selection Committee of AHISD teachers and staff met in February to select the District Teacher of the Year.

All five campus teachers of the year were recognized at the February 18 Board Meeting, where the District Teacher of the Year was announced.

A TALE OF TWO MULES:

Reflecting on 70+ Years of Family,
Friendship, and Community

Bartell Zachry and Dick Peacock, Class of 1950

WHEN DICK PEACOCK '50 THINKS BACK ON HIS HIGH SCHOOL YEARS—spent in the very building that serves as Cambridge Elementary School today—he fondly remembers his good friend, the late Bartell Zachry '50.

"Bartell and I had a lot of fun in high school," Dick reflects. "Our friendship lasted a lifetime and grew to include our wives, Paula and Mollie, our families, and other classmates like Rusty Crowley '50 and his wife, June."

The two men came to the district from different paths. Dick transferred into Alamo Heights in the eighth grade. Bartell had moved to San Antonio from Laredo in 1941 when his father relocated to establish his construction business, which would later become known internationally as the H.B. Zachry Company. Once their paths crossed at Alamo Heights, they remained intertwined for decades.

Leadership, Flight, and the Mule Stall

As leaders of the Class of 1950, both young men served as senior class officers—Dick as Class President and Bartell as Recording Secretary. Beyond their leadership roles, Dick was highly involved in Adv. and Hi-Y, while Bartell kept busy with varsity football, Hi-Y, and the school band. Bartell's charisma also earned him the title of "Most Popular" alongside classmate Betty Menefee.

From the 1950 Olmos Yearbook:

"The Class of 1950 has been an enthusiastic and diligent group, which has commanded the respect and admiration of our community and our city. Their reputation as dependable and reliable workers will entitle the members to their rightful places as citizens of our America."

When they weren't in class, the center of the social scene for the Class of 1950 was a beloved local hangout. "The Mule Stall was a little building that had been given to us by Handy Andy," Peacock recalls. "It was down on Broadway with an open dance floor, a living room, and a kitchen. We particularly enjoyed going there after the football games and all."

Away from school, the duo found adventure in the skies. Having achieved the remarkable feat of earning his pilot's license at just 14 years old, Bartell would often pilot a single-engine plane with Dick in the passenger seat. The friends would fly down to Laredo for weekends spent hunting jackrabbits at the Zachry ranch.

"Bartell was very committed to whatever he was doing," Dick notes of his friend's early aviation skills. "He was a good pilot."

From the Bubble to Corporate Success

Following graduation, both Mules headed to College Station to attend Texas A&M University. Bartell remained there, graduating with a Bachelor of Science degree in civil engineering in 1954, while Dick later transferred to the University of Texas to finish his degree.

Despite attending different universities, the two never lost touch. As the years rolled on, Bartell went on to become the chairman of the board and CEO of the H.B. Zachry Company. Dick carved out his own highly successful path in San Antonio, establishing

his own commercial real estate firm, The Richard M. Peacock & Co.

A Lasting Legacy

Today, Dick Peacock still brings that signature Class of 1950 work ethic to life, continuing to go into the office every single day. He deeply enjoys his time spent with family and longtime friends, including Bartell's widow, Mollie Zachry.

Recently, over lunch, Dick and Mollie spent time reminiscing about the decades of wonderful times shared between their families. Though Bartell sadly passed away in June 2020, and Dick's beloved wife Paula passed in December 2021, the memories they left behind remain vibrant. Their lunch was filled with stories of fun times at the ranches, travels all over the world, and a celebration of the true importance of lifelong friendship.

For Dick Peacock, the blue and gold spirit has never faded. Decades after walking the halls, he remains deeply thankful for his Alamo Heights school memories, and profoundly grateful for the lifetime of friendship he shared with Bartell.

THE POWER OF SHOWING UP:

How AHISD Prepared Kathy Kiolbassa Spalding '78 for a Lifetime of Service

Today, Kathy lives in San Antonio and serves as the President of the Assistance League of San Antonio—an all-volunteer non-profit dedicated to enriching and impacting the lives of local children and families through community programs. Here, she shares her journey from the halls of Alamo Heights to a lifetime of service.

Carefree Fun and Lifelong Connections

My favorite high school memories involve my friends, the fun times we had at football games, being part of Chaps, and the Mule Stall. I have fond memories of classes with some of my favorite teachers—Spanish with Mr. Eng, English with Mrs. Tibbits, typing with Mrs. Groos, Art with Mr. Loving, and so many more!

We were a tight-knit class that all got along despite any differences. We went to lunch at Sills Snack Shack, Frontier, and Adelante, and met up at Mr. M's, where we would decide whose house we were going to hang out at. It was a time of carefree fun, studying, listening to music, looking ahead to college, and creating lifelong friendships.

Navigating a 40-Year Career

I went to TCU, where I originally planned to study art and advertising. However, plans changed, and I graduated in 1982 with a Bachelor of Science in Education. That was the beginning of a fulfilling 40-year career in education right here in San Antonio, which included both classroom teaching and administrative work.

Following my retirement, I stumbled upon the Assistance League of San Antonio. I joined in 2022, and after serving in several leadership positions, I became the organization's President. It is an honor and a humbling experience to lead this group of volunteers who give so much of their time and energy to such a worthy cause. Our flagship programs provide new clothes, shoes, and personal items to clothing-insecure children from birth through fifth grade.

A Call to Service

A Legacy of Purpose

BACK IN THE BUBBLE:

Meet the McSweens



FOR CLASS OF 2010 GRADUATES CAROLINE (GREEHEY) AND THOMAS MCSWEEN, THE PHRASE “ALAMO HEIGHTS IS A TIGHT-KNIT COMMUNITY” ISN'T JUST A CLICHÉ—IT'S THEIR ENTIRE STORY.

First meeting as first-graders at Cambridge Elementary in the “Family” program, the pair reconnected senior year, survived the long-distance college divide, married in 2017, and eventually moved back home to San Antonio in 2018.

Today, they are raising three young children (with their oldest starting at Howard Elementary this fall) and fully immersing themselves back into the community that raised them. Ironically—or perhaps prophetically—they both won the senior superlative “Most likely to move back to the bubble.”

We caught up with the high school sweethearts to talk Mules football, the teachers who shaped them, and what it's like to raise the next generation of Mules.

The High School Years

What are your favorite memories from your time at Alamo Heights?

- **Caroline:** Winning the state championship my freshman year—what a way to start high school! I loved the football games, sporting events in general, and having my teammates over to hang out between school and practice.
- **Thomas:** Friday night football games and team dinners. So much time was spent with “your people” during that time of the year. The best memories were in the simplicity of it.

Which sports or activities meant the most to you?

- **Caroline:** Cheerleading all four years, the Challenger Program with AHLL, and being part of the very first Rocketry group.
- **Thomas:** Primarily football, but also baseball and track.

Is there a teacher or coach who made a lasting impact on you?

- **Thomas:** Coach Byrd, my head football coach. He believed in me, helped me become a leader, and put our team in a position to succeed (including winning the state title in 2006). He was stern but fair, and his goal was to set us up for life after football. He was instrumental to my maturity on and off the field, and we still keep up to this day.
- **Caroline:** I have two! First, Mrs. Beach, my 2nd-grade teacher at Cambridge. Long before formal programs existed, she was providing extra food for families in

need and encouraging inclusion on the playground. She was the teacher I hoped to one day embody. Second, my high school cheer coach, Carrie Hill. She saw leadership in me and helped me realize that true leadership comes from making others feel included, motivated, and supported. Many of my cheer girls are still my best friends today.

Then and Now

What paths did you take after graduation?

- **Caroline:** I studied Early Childhood and Special Education at TCU. I actually applied to Teach for America and got denied, but that closed door led me to a private Christian school in Houston's 3rd Ward serving low-income families. The days were long and hard, but so rewarding. When we moved back to San Antonio in 2018, my AH roots actually helped me secure a 2nd-grade teaching job at Fort Sam Houston—I got to teach alongside the wife of one of my childhood AHLL coaches!
- **Thomas:** I headed to Texas A&M. After college, I ended up in Houston too, which is where we were married. Now, I'm working as a trader for Valero Energy.

What does a typical day look like for you both now?

- **Thomas:** Work, then coming home to wrangle the three kids and our Golden Retriever, Riggs. On the weekends, I love coaching, hunting, fly fishing, and anything outdoors. I actually just completed my first coaching gig for my daughter's 5-year-old T-ball team, "The Piggies." It taught me a lot about patience!
- **Caroline:** Right now, I'm raising our babies and volunteering. My daughter Lila Grace starts at Howard

this fall, so I'm plugging into the Howard PTO, Greater Heights Night, and ASK Bible study. My days are spent at Bible Study Fellowship, open gyms, the botanical garden, the DoSeum, or the Pearl splash pad. I've also recently taken up Mahjong!

How did you two meet and end up together?

- **Caroline:** We met in 1st grade at Cambridge Elementary as part of "The Family" program, but we didn't actually start dating until December of our senior year. We broke up when we left for separate colleges (TCU for me, Texas A&M for Thomas), but we quickly rekindled the flame over our first Christmas break back home and never looked back.

Just for fun: Who made the first move?

- **Caroline:** Thomas made the first move! Homecoming 2009—in the rain!

What do you admire most about each other?

- **Caroline:** Thomas has a quiet steadiness and purpose with the way he lives his life. He is a man of integrity, and that seems increasingly rare in the world today. He works incredibly hard for our family and has already made such strides in his career, but no matter how demanding work becomes, he never loses sight of what matters most—being present for his family. He's involved in every single part of our kids' lives and truly shows up for us. He is there in the small moments listening patiently, playing, and leading by example. In fact, one of my first real friends, outside of family friends, I met on my first day at Cambridge, and she is now the godmother to my youngest son! My husband and I also still hang out with friends dating back to our original Cambridge "family class." Beyond social media, I'm really looking forward to staying involved locally through Greater Heights Night, the PTO, and ASK Bible study.
- **Thomas:** Very much so. My best friends from high school still remain my best friends today, and many of them have also moved back to Alamo Heights. Now that my own kids are starting to attend AHISD, I look forward to many years ahead of supporting and volunteering for the school.

Words Of Wisdom

What's something you've learned since graduation that surprised you?

- **Caroline:** The world is small—listen when your parents tell you that! You can almost always find a



connection with someone if you put yourself out there and ask some questions. There are also eyes everywhere, so be smart and be kind!

- **Thomas:** There is much more to life than pursuing career aspirations and success. My family and friends are what truly bring me happiness.

What are you most proud of so far?

- **Caroline:** The lifelong connections I have made with my former students and families, and the three beautiful babies I am raising right now.
- **Thomas:** My wife and kids, and the positive impact they are making on this community.

What advice would you give to current Alamo Heights students?

- **Caroline:** Truly plug in, get involved, and be nice! Your time here goes by so quickly, and some of the most meaningful experiences come from stepping outside of your comfort zone. Join the club, go to the game, try out for the team. Look for the people who don't know anyone and say hi—include them. The moments where you are looking outside of yourself are going to be the ones that make a lasting impact on your life. You will never regret being kind!
- **Thomas:** Limit the screen time and get outside! Be present for your family and friends—those are the memories that stick with you forever. Dear Alamo Heights Family,

"Play Ball"

THE ALAMO HEIGHTS HIGH SCHOOL SOFTBALL PROGRAM NOW OFFICIALLY CALLS MULE DIAMOND HOME.

The district's new softball facility, located at the AHISD Athletics Complex at Robbins, opened to the public in early March.

The facility includes the field, practice/storage areas, and a new building housing a concessions area, restrooms, locker rooms, coaches' offices, and meeting spaces. The new building is also utilized by the tennis program.

The varsity softball team beat Navarro 15-0 in the first game at Mule Diamond.

During pregame festivities, Superintendent Dr. Dana Bashara and former Board President Brian Hamilton threw ceremonial first pitches.



"The first game was a special day for our players, coaches, families, alumni, and community as we celebrated a facility that represents the continued growth and support of our athletic programs," said Jennifer Fox, Assistant Athletic Director and Softball Coach. "This field is more than just a place to play softball. It is a place where our student-athletes will learn lessons about teamwork, perseverance, leadership, and pride in representing Alamo Heights."

The new facility was made possible by the overwhelming community support for School Bond 2023.

UNDER CONSTRUCTION



ALAMO HEIGHTS HIGH SCHOOL

The new AHHS academic building continues to be on time and on budget and is scheduled to officially open in August 2026.

Most of the current work is focused on the building's interior, though landscaping is beginning, and the parking lot in front of the building is being developed.



AHISD ATHLETIC COMPLEX AT ROBBINS

The first softball games were held at the new Mule Diamond, part of the AHISD Athletics Complex at Robbins, in early March. The new building adjacent to the softball field, which houses concessions, restrooms, locker rooms for tennis and softball, coaches' offices, and meeting space, is also complete. Two additional parking lots are also now available off of Ramsey.

WOODRIDGE

During the summer, classroom refreshes will begin in the first- and second-grade hallways, as well as in the library, office, and main hallway.

The fifth-grade classroom expansion project will also be completed this summer, and the modular building will be removed.



CAMBRIDGE

Ongoing cafeteria and kitchen renovations at Cambridge necessitated a new dining space. After Spring Break in March, a temporary cafeteria serving line and seating areas were relocated to the Gold Gym.

The new Central Plant is still under construction, but is expected to be up and running in August when students and staff return.

Classroom refreshes also continue with Building 3 scheduled to be completed at the end of the school year. Building 4 work begins this summer, along with the library, office, and main hallway.

JUNIOR SCHOOL

Designs were approved for the Junior School in early 2026, and construction is expected to begin in June.

The Junior School project will take about two years to complete. The current track area will become a laydown yard for construction materials. Over the summer, the back loop will be redone to be more efficient for parking.

The new gym building will be erected near the current tennis courts and also house sixth-grade classroom space on the second floor.
