FROM THE PRESIDENT




2025 HALL OF FAME



DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI CLASS OF 1950

MARGARET JOHNSON CANBY. a 1950 AHHS graduate.

became a teacher and girls' tennis coach before traveling the world with her husband, Army physician Dr. John Canby. She led military family support networks, learning German and Hindi to connect across cultures. Returning to San Antonio, she championed local tennis, expanding access for all ages and abilities. As San Antonio Tennis Association Leagues coordinator for over a decade, she doubled league participation and helped bring tennis to schools, senior centers, veterans, and children with disabilities. A decorated competitor and six-time U.S. World Cup team member (four as captain), she won the 85 Women's World Cup in 2019 and has held multiple top international rankings. Her achievements have earned her induction into the Texas A&M Kingsville, Texas Senior Games, and Texas Sports Halls of Fame.



DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI CLASS OF 1967

BOB WORTH, a lifelong Alamo Heights resident and 1967 AHHS graduate, earned his degree from The University of Austin before launching a successful career in finance and real estate. In 1986, he founded Worth & Associates, which has developed over 3.3 million square feet of office space in San Antonio. Now Chairman of the Board, he passed leadership to his AHHS-alum children, Jordan Worth Arriaga '94 and Robert Clint Worth II '99, and his family's legacy in the district continues with two grandchildren currently attending AH schools and a grandson who has joined the newest ranks of AH alumni with the Class of 2025! Recognized with numerous industry honors, including UTSA's Ethics Award and the Real Estate Council's Legacy and Leadership Honor, Bob is also a committed philanthropist supporting education and medical research. He serves on multiple boards, including the Alamo Heights School Foundation, where he helped launch the Their Future! Endowment Campaign, securing over \$5.3 million for AHISD.



DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI CLASS OF 1968

THE HONORABLE SUSAN DOLAN REED, a 1968 AHHS

graduate, earned her Economics degree and law doctorate from The University of Texas. Beginning her career as a Bexar County Assistant District Attorney, she later became District Judge and then the first woman elected District Attorney for the county. Appointed to key criminal justice roles by multiple Texas governors, she served on the Criminal Justice Policy Council, Juvenile Justice Advisory Board, and co-chaired the Anti-Crime Commission. A national leader in legal reform, she has testified before Congress and the Texas Legislature, and served as president of the Texas District and County Attorney's Association. A strong advocate for victims' rights, Susan has supported numerous nonprofits and earned honors such as the Bexar County Pioneer Award and induction into the San Antonio Women's Hall of Fame. She currently serves as a Senior Judge for the 4th Judicial Region.



LIFETIME EDUCATOR
(POSTHUMOUSLY)

COACH GAYLARD FENLEY,

a transformative figure in AHISD athletics, served as Head Football Coach and Athletic Director from 1983 to 2001, leading a revival of the District's sports program. Arriving from Houston in 1983, he ended a 30-year playoff drought in just his second season and guided the Mules to an undefeated season and District Championship in 1991. Over his 18-year tenure, Coach Fenley's teams claimed ten State Championships, and he became a revered mentor who instilled values of discipline, perseverance, and teamwork. His impact extended beyond the field, earning honors such as Greater Houston Coach of the Year, the Tom Landry Award, and a posthumous induction into the Texas High School Athletic Directors Association Hall of Honor. Alongside his wife Carol, a beloved kindergarten teacher, Coach Fenley left a lasting legacy of excellence and character in the Alamo Heights community.



DISTINGUISHED SERVICE

STEVE ALLISON, former Texas House Representative for District 121, has devoted his life to public service and education. A longtime advocate for public schools, his connection to AHISD runs deep - his wife Peggy is a 1965 alumna, their children graduated from AHHS, and their family legacy continues with a grandson at Howard and a daughter-in-law teaching at Cambridge. Before his legislative role, Steve served 12 years on the AHISD Board of Trustees, including three terms as President, where he led efforts against recapture and championed school finance reform. A seasoned attorney, he spent over 46 years in private practice, served as a prosecutor, municipal judge, and held leadership roles in legal associations. In the Texas House, he served on key committees including Public Education and Appropriations, earning honors such as "Champion of Education" and "Hero for Children." His enduring commitment continues to shape both Alamo Heights and public education across Texas.

I was fortunate that Alamo Heights introduced computer programming into the classroom via a teletype terminal in 1970. Computers were not generally available to high schools at that time. I learned basic programming skills that soon came in handy. Paul Foerster encouraged Alan Kost and I to develop an idea we had for a new math function that was inspired by one of Mr. Foerster's extra credit homework assignments. We used the computer to perform calculations needed for our paper on the Cont function that we presented at a state math conference and received an award.

The major works STEM classes certainly accelerated my transition to college studies and provided the confidence and inspiration to pursue a career in nuclear engineering and space systems engineering. I'm glad to see that Alamo Heights remains on the forefront of offering advanced opportunities for those who want to take advantage of them. In particular, I'm impressed with the rocketry program, the advanced media facilities, and the arts and theater options that are available to students. I believe it's important for students to receive a well-rounded education and also be able dive deep into areas of interest that may inspire them to become future leaders in business, science, engineering, medicine, law, government, the arts, and literature.

ROCKETING TO NEW HEIGHTS



HUMPHREY "HOPPY" PRICE GRADUATED FROM ALAMO HEIGHTS HIGH SCHOOL IN 1972.

During his time there, Hoppy was a founding member of the Knights of Cobalt, a club dedicated to applying chemistry, physics, and mathematics to everyday living. Hoppy was also elected to the Student Council, served as vice-president of the Key Club, historian of Los Amigos, and was

a member of various clubs. As a member of the Alamo Heights High School math team, he helped secure many wins at statewide competitions. Additionally, he was the co-author of a state competition-winning paper describing a new mathematical function.

After graduating from Alamo Heights, Hoppy earned a Bachelor of Engineering Science from The University of Texas at Austin in 1976. He later achieved a Master of Science in Nuclear Engineering at UT Austin in 1978. While completing his Master's, he performed safety analyses of nuclear power plants at EDS Nuclear in San Francisco. That same year, he was hired at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) in Pasadena, CA, where he performed systems engineering for robotic planetary exploration vehicles.

At JPL, Hoppy engineered the top-level blueprints for the Cassini spacecraft that orbited Saturn from 2004-2017. The Cassini spacecraft was an innovative achievement of human and technical complexity that paved the way for future missions to explore the solar system. It showed us that Saturn's largest moon, Titan, has weather, climate, and geology that make it the most Earth-like body ever encountered. He also supervised the systems engineering group that developed the entry, descent, and landing system for the Spirit and Opportunity Mars rovers launched in the Summer of 2003. The rovers were positioned to land on opposite sides of Mars to better explore for clues about the history of water on the planet. These rovers provided evidence that Mars conditions were once suited for ancient life, and that liquid water once flowed through part of the planet. In 2012, he was the Project System Engineer for the two Gravity Recovery and Interior Laboratory (GRAIL) spacecraft. This mission required the spacecraft to orbit the moon and map its gravitational field, and the gravity map generated by the probes has the highest-quality resolution of any celestial body to date.

In addition to these important achievements, Hoppy provides engineering support to NASA's human spaceflight program. He is currently part of the engineering team working to return U.S. astronauts to the moon and has supported several NGOs, such as the Planetary Society, to help promote astronomy and exploration of our solar system.



TO THE RUNWAY



From varsity track to fashion entrepreneur, Lee Evans Lee '97 shares how her AHISD roots shaped her journey through TV, counseling, ranch life, and motherhood.

Did you participate in any clubs or extracurriculars at AHHS?

Lee ran track, played softball, and was active in theater. "Team sports taught me how to win and lose with grace, how to work with others, and how to lead. You can't just talk your way into something - you have to show up and do the work."

How did growing up as a 5th-generation rancher shape who you are?

"The ranch was a huge part of my life – it still is. My family continues to run it, and my son is now the sixth generation...It taught me perseverance. Droughts still happen, and life throws curveballs. Even when it doesn't rain, something is still blooming."

Your career has evolved across TV, counseling, ranching, and fashion. How did those paths lead you to where you are today?

"My dad had the same job for over 50 years. Early on, I thought changing careers was a negative. Now I see each chapter played a part, and thank goodness I had the courage to pivot." Lee's priorities shifted when her son was born. She worked full-time while studying counseling at night and volunteering. When COVID hit, she stepped back to homeschool, and that's when Mrs. Momma Bear was born. "I love journaling and drawing, and during COVID, I started making fashion sketches. I'd worn suits in TV and scrubs in hospitals, and both were uncomfortable. I wanted a happy medium...I want women to feel bold and confident and know they have choices in their closets." Her line features stylish, functional suits made from athletic material, clothes you can wear from the park to an interview. "In all my pivots, I've learned it's not what you do, but how you do it. Even if you're scared, do it anyway."

What advice would you give current **Alamo Heights students?**

"I would tell them what I tell my son: 'What do you get lost in during the day? What can you do for hours and never get bored?' Start there. That's your spark. Follow it and don't let go... We're all raised with beliefs about what life should look like, but don't box yourself in. Don't be afraid to pivot. If you do, we might lose the next Albert Einstein. Every time I've boxed myself in, it was because of an old belief that no longer served me."

How has public school prepared you for your journey?

Lee credits her independence, drive, and resilience to her upbringing in Alamo Heights public schools. Her mother was a fourth-grade public school teacher, and that shaped her deeply. "I love public schools. To me, they reflect the real world. At AH, I was exposed to all kinds of people, experiences, and expectations. It wasn't just what we learned in class, but the spirit of the people around me. That gave me everything I would need later in life."

What does being part of the Alamo Heights alumni community mean to you?

"This is where it all began. AHHS is the start of my story. I've lived all over the world, but I chose to come back here to raise my son...there's a spirit here, a culture of lifting each other up. It's not about being perfect. It's about waking up and saying, 'Tomorrow, we'll try to do a little better.' Being able to say I'm doing that now brings me to tears. As an AH alum, so much of who I am is a reflection of what this community gave me."

FROM THE HALLS OF ALAMO HEIGHTS TO THE PGA TOUR:

MAC MEISSNER '17 RETURNS HOME FOR THE VALERO TEXAS OPEN



ALAMO HEIGHTS ALUM MAC MEISSNER'17 recently returned to his hometown of San Antonio for a special moment in his blossoming golf career – competing in the Valero Texas Open at TPC San Antonio as a second-year PGA Tour pro.

Though Meissner built an impressive golf résumé during his time at Alamo Heights - including being named the Express-News Boys Golfer of the Year in 2017 and co-champion of the UIL Class 5A state tournament - it wasn't until his collegiate years that he began to truly see a future in professional golf. "College is where it all clicked," he said.

At SMU, Meissner thrived. He was named an All-American three times and capped off his college career by earning the prestigious Byron Nelson Award in 2021. That same year, he turned professional and spent the next two seasons competing on the Korn Ferry Tour, where he recorded a standout round of 59 at the 2023 LECOM Suncoast Classic.

His consistent play earned him a PGA Tour card as of the 2024 season, and he quickly found success - making 26 cuts, earning more than \$1.8 million, and notching a top-five finish at the Charles Schwab Challenge. In the early part of 2025, Meissner continued to show steady form, including a top-25 finish at the Sony Open in Hawaii.

Competing at the Valero Texas Open was a full-circle moment for Meissner, who grew up attending the

It's the perfect balance."

Representing San Antonio and Alamo Heights on the national stage, Meissner's return to the Valero Texas Open was a proud moment for the Mule community. We're excited to follow his journey as he continues to rise on the PGA Tour.


How I've Been Shaped as a Person and Leader:





THE 89TH LEGISLATIVE SESSION CLOSED ON JUNE 2,

and while it brought attention to school finance, it fell far short of addressing the real needs of public schools like ours. Despite broad recognition of rising costs, no increase was made to the Basic Allotment, the primary funding source for public schools. Instead, a new Allotment for Basic Costs was created, providing just \$106 per student, a fraction of \$1,340 increase needed to restore our district's purchasing power to 2019 levels.

Because of these ongoing funding gaps and the continued recapture cost, the Alamo Heights School Foundation plays a critical role in protecting our tradition of excellence. Thanks to the Foundation's

\$2 million donation this year, we can maintain smaller class sizes across all K-12 classrooms, an impact that touches every student and teacher.

House Bill 2 provides long-overdue salary increases for classroom teachers but does not address the deeper, structural issues in Texas school finance. It is community investment, not state funding, that is sustaining the exceptional education Alamo Heights is known for.
